Associate Professor Hamish Maxwell-Stewart



Hamish Maxwell-Stewart was born in Nigeria and brought up in southern England. He has a degree in history and a PhD in economic and social history from the University of Edinburgh.

After working for the Wellcome Unit for the History of Medicine, University of Glasgow, he migrated to Australia in the mid 1990s. He is now an Associate Professor in the School of History and Classics, University of Tasmania where he lectures on Australian and colonial history, issues of global development and heritage conservation and interpretation. He has published a number of books including *Closing Hell's Gates: The Death of a Convict Station* (Allen and Unwin, 2008) which won the 2009 Margaret Scott award. He is currently the co-ordinator of a multi-university interdisciplinary project which aims to investigate the long-run impact of convict transportation to Australia on health and well being.
